

The Public Health Practitioners Accredited Programme 2021/22



The Public Health Practitioners Accredited programme (PHPAP) utilises the Faculty of Public Health's years of experience in delivering successful courses within public health. The programme provides an excellent opportunity to develop skills and knowledge for people who are not specialists or practitioners in public health, but have the opportunity or ability to positively impact health and wellbeing through their work.

Programme Delivery

The aim of the PHPAP is to develop a broad range of development opportunities via online workshops that meet the changing needs of the wider public health workforce. The programme is currently delivered virtually through a series of six professionally facilitated half day workshops.

The learning sessions support attendees in the acquisition and application of knowledge required by the UK Public Health Practitioner (UKPHR) standards, and have been mapped to the UKPHR practitioners' standards (2018 edition). The programme has been endorsed by Skills for Justice (SFJ). SFJ Awards is a nationally recognised and regulated awarding organisation.

The course will also give you the opportunity:

■ To hone knowledge and understanding about public health, including those who have recently moved into public health from another discipline or area.

- To build knowledge underpinning the UKPHR practitioner standards, to enable you to demonstrate learning as part of your portfolio if you are considering applying to become a registered UKPHR practitioner.
- To use CPD credits obtained in the workshops to further your knowledge and skills.

Skills for Justice (SFJ) Accredited Certificate

Participants also have the option to undertake an assessment of learning to gain a SFJ certificate. Participants are required to write a short report for 4 of the UKPHR standards, demonstrating understanding of the Those theoretical knowledge for that standards in relation to their role. A candidate will need to describe a theory, showing their understanding of that theory and how it relates to their area of work.
