#### **Synopsis**

The COVID-19 pandemic has heightened awareness of Public Health among clinicians, policy-makers, and the general public at large. As prevention becomes a staple in policy discourse, we observe a concerning trend: our Public Health infrastructure and resources are regressing towards pre-pandemic levels. At the same time, the future health care workforce is undergoing seismic shifts with significant implications for Public Health. Among the major uncertainties is the question of what a doctor is. The rise of apprenticeships, abbreviated training programmes, and medical associate professions (Physician Associates et al), present challenges to established professional identities and scopes of practice. This interactive webinar will delve into the essence of Public Health learning - its skills, competencies, and approaches to training - and discuss the integration of Population Health concepts within clinical education and training.
